SHILOH BAPTIST CHURCH NEW SITE WOMEN'S MINISTRY VIRTUAL FOOD DRIVE





THE HEALTH CARE MINISTRY

COVID 19 and IT'S EFFECTS ON TEENAGERS' MENTAL HEALTH

COVID-19 continues to cause a rather sinister and devastating effect on people across America, teens included.

Reports show a decline in the number of COVID-19 cases and deaths in many states. Some states, however, show an increase in the number of cases. How will this data effect the livelihood of our teenagers? Answers to this question remain a mystery.

Many schools have reopened, and restrictions have lifted across America in all different venues and businesses; will this new growing trend have a positive effect on the emotional state of teenagers, or will the data remain constant? Prior to these new regulations, and during the COVID-19 Pandemic, signs of depression, suicidal attempts, and actually going through with a successful suicide was met with concern from mental health professionals.

Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) stated, "Teen suicide attempts with hospitalizations surged during the COVID-19 lockdown. Female adolescents ages 12-17 visited the emergency departments (ED) for suicide attempts between February and March of 2021 at a nearly 51 percent higher rate compared to the same time frame in 2019 before the COVID-19 lockdowns. Stay-at-home orders forced businesses and schools to close due to plummeting consumer demand and mandatory safety precautions. Even before COVID-19, youth suicide was already at a record high. Suicide is the second leading cause of death among people ages 10-24 and has been increasing every year since 2007."

CDC further states that, "For a short period between March and April of 2020, ED visits for suspected suicide attempts among people ages 12-25 declined but then began to rise again during the summer. The increase in reported suicide attempts among girls did not

directly correspond to more suicide deaths.”

University of California Davis Health, adolescent medicine physician, Laura Kester Prakash says, “The challenges that children and teens normally face have been amplified by isolation and distancing during the Pandemic.”

There is also an increase in the number of deaths due to drug overdose that far exceed the number of deaths from COVID-19 for females and males.

Male suicide attempts are also very disturbing; according to CDC, “Hanging was the most common suicide method accounting for 51.4% of cases. The most common suicide causalities were related to mental sufferings such as depression, loneliness, and psychological distress. Additionally, online schooling or overwhelming academic distress was placed as the second most suicide stressors followed by Tic Tok addiction-related psychological distress, and getting tested for COVID-19”.

Suicidal signs that parents should be looking for include the following:

- 1) Increased anxiety,
- 2) Unnecessary risk-taking,
- 3) Feeling trapped or in unbearable pain,
- 4) Lack of response to praise,
- 5) Looking for a way to access lethal means,
- 6) Increased anger, rage or hostility,
- 7) Extreme mood swings,
- 8) Problems focusing,
- 9) Running away,
- 10) Expressing hopelessness,
- 11) Changes in eating and sleeping habits (eating and/or sleeping too little or too much),
- 12) Talking, posting or obsessing about death or wanting to die,
- 13) Making plans for suicide,

14) More physical complaints often linked to emotional distress, such as stomachaches, headaches, and extreme tiredness (fatigue),

15) Making plans or efforts toward committing suicide or writing a suicide note, and

16) Giving or throwing away important possessions.

Measures parents can take include the following:

- 1) Concerned Parents may increase communications and express that you love them and are there for them,
- 2) It is very important to listen to your child,
- 3) Make attempts to prevent your child from spending too much time alone,
- 4) Pay attention as to whether your child is withdrawing from activities,
- 5) Safely secure medications, substances and/or weapons at home, and
- 6) Do not downplay nor ignore statements that the child makes about hurting themselves.

Contact a mental health provider or take the child to the closest Psychiatric Emergency Room for evaluation and possible inpatient admission for Clinical Depression. Treatment may include:

- 1) Individual and Family Therapy,
- 2) Inpatient and Outpatient Treatment,
- 3) Medication, and
- 4) Physical health needs that include nutrition, rest and activities.

OTHER GODS
Spiritual Food for Thought

Many of us today, as Christians, who profess faith in God, through His Son, Jesus the Christ, as creator of the universe, fail to realize that we live in a world that embraces the worship of other gods, and we inadvertently join the throng in the worship of other gods. Consider briefly that the yearly calendar most of us we use daily, contains the names of days in the week, and months in the year that have been attributed to the worship of the idol gods of the Romans, that have been passed down to us, and we participate, unconsciously, in the worship of other gods, every time we used the word Sunday (name of the Roman sun god), and January (Janus, name of the Roman god with two faces that looks forward and backward in time). So the question is, how can we avoid the worship of other gods?

The answer to that question may be in the understanding that we cannot avoid the worship of other gods. While our understanding of the terms “God” and “gods” usually relates to deities, it may be understood that “gods” can consist of things that consume an inordinate amount of our time and attention, such as, the struggle for survival involving work that produces income and wealth, and hobbies. In Exodus 20:3, the King James version of the Holy Bible that contains the Ten Commandments that God gave Moses for His chosen people to live by, the First Commandment reads, “Have no other gods before me.” An understanding of the statement, “Have no other gods before me,” is imperative. It appears that God in His infinite wisdom knew that mankind would have other gods, but other gods should not take the first preference in mankind’s existence. Consequently, knowledge is essential to the exercise of the wisdom of the First Commandment. Consider Genesis 14:1–20, as it relates to the story of Abraham, one of the richest men in the Eastern Hemisphere, who, due to circumstances, lost some of his possessions to raiding kings, and when God enabled him to get it back, he gave a tithe (10%) back to God. Consider Genesis 28:1–22, as it relates to the story of Jacob, who, due to circumstances, had to run away from the comfort and security of his home environment, and while sojourning, he had a dream that God would protect him, cause him to be prosperous, and return him to his home in peace. When Jacob awakened from his dream, he made a vow, that if God would protect him, cause him to be prosperous, and return him to his home again in peace, he would give God a tithe (10%) of his possessions. If you are struggling every day just to live, and you are not tithing, you may want to consider the stories herein, and the wisdom of tithing that could change your life. I would be amiss if I failed to add my personal experiences, about growing up in a Christian home, among Christian parents and siblings, who believed that tithing, rather than words, (thank you Lord), was the individual’s testimony to God’s providence. In Malachi 3:16–17, the prophet addressed those who had promised to support the Temple in Jerusalem. While some had failed, those who continued to support the Temple were reminded to continue doing what was required of them, and not to worry about what others did, that when the Lord of hosts returns to make up His jewels, they would belong to the Lord.

The Gift of Myrrh*

“And when they had come into the house, they saw the young Child with Mary His mother, and fell down and worshiped Him. And when they had opened their treasures, they presented gifts to Him: gold, frankincense, and myrrh.”—Matthew 2:11

Myrrh resin, the raw product used to yield the final myrrh product, is extracted from the *Commiphora myrrha* plant species, a group of plants characterized by large thorns. The plant is cut and the leaking resin is allowed to harden and then harvested. Myrrh is a multipurpose commodity, used as an antiseptic, analgesic (painkiller), relief and cure for internal diseases, spice, anointing oil, incense, perfume, and an ancient embalming ingredient.

Myrrh was a highly valued and instrumental product in the Old Testament or Hebrew Bible. It was one of the goods the Ishmaelites were transporting to sell when they took Joseph into Egypt (Genesis 37:25). God directed Moses to use myrrh as an ingredient in creating the holy anointing oil for the tabernacle (Exodus 30:23). Myrrh was used to anoint and perfume the women vying to become queen to King Xerxes I, to include Esther (Esther 2:12). Myrrh is one of the romantic scents spoken of throughout Song of Songs.

Myrrh continued to be a product of importance in the New Testament, as it traced the life of Jesus. Along with gold and frankincense, it was one of the Wise Men’s gifts to honor the Child who would be King of Kings (Matthew 2:11). Myrrh was the pain reliever mixed with wine offered to and rejected by Jesus on the cross (Mark 15:23). Finally, it was part of the mixture prepared to anoint Jesus’ body in death (John 19:39–40).

Despite the sweet scent associated with myrrh, a root of the word is the Arabic word “murr,” bitter or bitterness. This sweet, valued gift presented to Jesus as a child was a foretelling of the bitterness the Son of God would suffer on our behalf. He would be offered a cup of bitterness as He died on the cross and buried in this same bitterness as the final, hasty anointing of His body in death. Colognes and perfumes will fill the air of department stores and malls, and be amongst the gifts given and received over the holidays. As we take in the bouquet of those scents around us, may we remember the irony, that which is so bitter can create such a sweet scent. God came in human form to suffer through the bitterness of rejection by His own creation, the bitterness of betrayal and desertion by those closest to Him, the bitterness of horrific suffering on the cross, and the bitterness of death. Jesus accepted the gift of myrrh or bitterness so we could enjoy the sweet aroma of God’s salvation, grace, mercy and love.




